Games and Potluck Feast - 30 August

The feast and Tournament are being held to celebrate the Knight of Honour and the Lady of Honour for the following days tournament. On Saturday the 30th of August there shall be an afternoon of games commencing at 2pm, followed by a potluck feast from 6pm. This great event shall be held at the Hall Showgrounds Hall, Hall.

Come and enjoy an afternoon of fun and games, presented by Baron Stephen. Those who were at the winter games last year will know full well that this is not something to be missed. This shall be followed by a potluck feast featuring diverse entertainment and a display of the helms of entrants in the morrow's tourney. The games will be French and you are encouraged to bring 15c French dishes to the feast.

Heraldic Tourney – 31 August

This tourney is to be held from 11:30am until approximately 4pm on the 31st of August 2003. It is a single kill, double elimination tourney, with half the rounds being fought using specified weapons and/or at the barrier. It shall be held at Eddison Park, Phillip, near the cemetery.

Rule of Entry

Every fighter must have a consort or a person who inspires them on this day. A consort is defined as 'the one whose favour you bear on the day'. When introducing themselves to the Lady of Honour, each fighter must either name or (preferably) present the person whose favour they bear.

Heraldic Display

This tourney is being held to celebrate those who inspire us to greatness and the beauty of heraldic display demonstrates this. As such, there is considerable emphasis on such display, with fighters being rewarded by the Lady of Honour for grand display. This reward is in the form of extra lives in the tourney.

Helmet Display

At the feast, there will be a display of the helmets of those who intend to fight in the tourney on the morrow. The Lady of Honour will judge these helmets based on their heraldic appearance, selecting two. The owners of these helmets will become the captains of the melee teams the next day. It is not necessary to enter the helmet display to participate in the tourney, however it is beneficial, as the captain of the winning side in the melee gains an extra life in the tourney.

Presentation to the Lady of Honour and the Gallery

On the morning of the tourney, after armour inspection and registration with the lists, each fighter must present themselves to the Lady of Honour. At this time they must name the person whose favour they bear. The manner of the fighter's presentation is up to them. At the minimum they must formally introduce themselves to the Lady of Honour. Presenting themselves, and naming or presenting the person whose favour they bear. Fighters may be accompanied by "retainers" such as personal banner bearers, shield bearer, personal herald singing praises and wearing personal livery...

The Lady of Honour may, at her discretion, reward fighters who present themselves well with extra lives in the tourney. Such reward will be based on the categories of personal heraldic display (helmet, tabard, shield, etc) and the manner of their presentation (see above, or do research, for ideas).

Prizes

The Lady of Honour will award prizes as follows: The captain of the team that wins the melee (this will be a 'purse of gold' – chocolate to be shared among the winners of the melee.)

The one who holds the field at the end of the day. The winner of the tourney – this is ladies choice.

Further Advice on Heraldry

What follows are some thoughts on heraldic display for those who wish to enter the tourney.

Whose Heraldry?

You may wish to demonstrate who inspires you on the day by wearing their heraldry, this is especially useful if you don't have your own device registered. Naturally, you should discuss it with your consort or patron first. Helmet Display

Display on a helmet can include more than just a wreath or torse. It can also include a crest or plume of feathers (there are no lights on the tourney field, so there's no problem with identification). If you want inspiration I can suggest you look at Heraldry books – both Fox-Davies and Neubecker have pictures of medieval rolls of arms, which include helmet crests and the associated devices they are based on.

You are strongly encouraged to wear the helmet crest in the tourney, after all, why else make it.

Recipe of the Month

Pastés de Poires Crues (Whole Pear Pie)

"Stand three large pears in a pie and fill the gaps with about quarteron of sugar, cover well and glaze with eggs or saffron, and put in the oven"

from Le Viandier de Guillaume Tirel dit Taillevent, $15^{\rm th}$ Century manuscript

I LOVE this recipe, simple and easy to make, especially if you cheat and use commercial frozen pastry, but be warned, not only is it impossible to serve a single, solid slice (definitely a "spooned up" pie) but it's also rich enough to gold plate your stomach.

I found that a bread tin works better than a conventional pie tin. Grease and flour, and I strongly recommend lining the base with greaseproof paper to prevent the bottom getting scratched when you dish up. Line with your favourite short pastry, rolled not too thin. The original doesn't state if the pears should be peeled or not, but I definitely preferred it when they were. Packham pears were ok, but Commice pears (similar to Buerre Bosc) were definitely superior in flavour and especially texture. Three pears is stated in the original, and when I used a short-but-tall bread tin, that was fine, but for a standard bread tin, use as many as will fit.

Redon, Sabban and Serventi's "<u>The Medieval Kitchen – Recipes from France and Italy"</u> states that a quarteron is around 120g. Given that I worked on the "as many as will fit" theory for the pears, after my first attempt I simply filled in all the gaps with sugar. What type you should use is also up for debate. Redon et al prefer superfine; I found ordinary white sugar was fine and that soft (light) brown sugar (demerera or very light muscavado) added a really nice flavour.

Leave the stems on the pears so they puncture the lid of your pie to let some steam out (no steam holes means you wind up with a weird sort of pear soup under the top crust.) Glaze with egg yolk or a little hot milk that has been coloured with one or two strands of saffron. Cook at 200 C / 400 F for around 90 min. Have your foil ready to cover the top if it looks like the pastry is browning too early, as this pie needs the long cook. The pear inside releases juice into the sugar which caramelises and turns into a rich, sticky pear syrup, while the pears themselves become deliciously soft and tasty. Light cream drizzled over is the ultimate in hideously rich yumminess.

Book Review:

The Pimlico Encyclopaedia of the Middle Ages – Norman F. Cantor,

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The problem with any such book is that one becomes frustrated with the limited details they have on any given subject. Usually I use such books a browser to pick up bits and pieces on places/periods I don't know very much about or as a 'quick link' to find different people or events in the same time period. Unfortunately, like many of its type, it concentrates on Western Continental Europe, the Crusader States and England (but only token nods to Wales, Scotland and Ireland). It does pay token tribute to Eastern Europe by mentioning some of the better known royalty of Russia, Lithuania and Hungary, but the Byzantine Empire seems criminally under represented. Having said that, the people of the Middle East and Northern Africa do get represented more than is usual, and frequently in a focus beyond just the crusades.

It devotes a great deal to the Church, its ins and outs, politics, beliefs and changing habits (no pun intended) which I found quite interesting. In addition to articles on various saints and popes, it also has essays on the bible, indulgences, various sects – both heretical and orthodox – papal politics and discusses various abbeys and cathedrals.

Possibly the most frustrating group of articles – frustrating in their limitations – are those devoted to aspects of life. Not surprisingly, there are separate entries for weaponry, warfare, arms and armour, castles and fortifications, artillery, chivalry, as well as numerous battles. Women by contrast are reduced to one general entry and various biographies. In its favour, it also has entries for coronation, exploration, communes, architecture, prisons and punishments, mosaic, sculpture and music, amongst others.

For the long-term, well read SCA member, I'd suggest a flick through – you won't get any in depth information but you'll probably pick up a few interesting things you didn't know. However, I would highly recommend it as the ideal gift for a new member, with enough general information to bring them up to speed on medieval life, plenty of people and places to give ideas for personas and further research, lots of period illustrations and, very nicely, lots of maps of areas discussed.
