I want to draw your attention to the Rowany Festival again. Volunteer heralds are needed for the tourneys, regular calls and courts. I want to have a timetable as solid as possible as early as possible. This will give the brave volunteers as much chance to plan their Festival life around their commitments. My best hope is that everyone will work a little as a herald, in a coordinated way, and then nobody will have to work a lot.

There will be at least 8 heralds needed for the Fighter Auction Tourney. We envision a Royal Court every afternoon, and I always look for 2 heralds in a court; so that is 10 court shifts. The Fighter Auction itself is not an official herald job, but several heralds will be involved I am sure. The Rapier guys have a lot of heralds amongst them, but I would like a duty herald specifically for each tourney, so another 2 shifts there. There will be 5 morning calls for sure, and maybe some in the afternoon. The Heraldic Melee requires the teams provide their own heralds.

All up I count more than 25 shifts for individual heralds in court or tourney work. So far there are only two volunteers that have put their hands up, and I thank them very much. There is plenty of room and encouragement for junior heralds or novices to act as a second and be "blooded" into the job with a senior to guide and assist. I want this to happen very much.

I am looking for helpers, and I am happy to accept all levels of experience and expertise in heraldic matters. Citizens from all groups in Lochac are invited to volunteer, and I am sure that Festival Officers in other fields of endeavour are searching for assistance as well.

Ferrets in Period



This is from an illuminated manuscript from France. THE HUNTING BOOK (also known as (THE BOOK OF THE HUNT, or GASTON PHOEBUS' BOOK OF THE HUNT, etc.) was written by Gaston Pheobus, the Count of Foix and Viscount of Bearn. He was born in 1331, wrote this book sometime between May 1387 and his death in 1391. He was well-known for being an excellent huntsman, putting on good parties, and for being an all-round great guy. He wrote this book to explain how to hunt different kinds of animals, how to handle dogs, set up blinds, etc. The plate shown here illustrates how to use ferrets to hunt rabbits, and shows the hunters putting muzzled ferrets down rabbit holes, waiting for the rabbits to pop out the other end and into the nets.





Siege: The Art or Going Ballistic

n the ancient battlefield siege armaments were a rare occurrence. If you were to watch a Hollywood movie they would have you believe different. Artillery was predominantly used for sieges and for the protection of fortifications. When the machines were deployed in support of an army it was usually restricted to river crossings and covering fire for narrow fields of fire. Alexander the Great, and many other Roman generals, used light ballistae and onagers for this very reason.



Artillery battles in ancient times were very rare but not totally unheard of, however. For example:

Onomarchus (a Phocian), placed rock throwers on steep hills behind his main force and defeated Philip of Macedon twice in pitch clashes. Philip retreated but returned "like a ram to butt harder". He had had to recruit more cavalry to finally route the Phocians.


Julius Caesar made use of ballistae for river crossings and beach landings, though the ballistae were mainly used to guard encampments. A Caesarian Legion of 3000 Legionaries would be equipped with 30 ballistas, this equates to 1 ballista (scorpion) for each 100 men in the legion. These machines would have

been used to line the camp walls. Thus a 10,000 man camp would have approximately 800-meter square (3200 meters) of wall to cover. Under the rule of Trajan the number of machines increased to 60 per Legion but the Legion itself increased to 6000 men, which meant the ratio remained the same.

Even the Spartans used artillery! In one battle they placed bolt throwers on their side of a ditch, which separated them from the Achaeans under Philipoeman in the battle of Mantinea in 207BC. The intent was to soften the Achaean phalanx before combat was engaged...unfortunately, the Spartan General was separated from his phalanx who charged to soon and was repulsed at the ditch.

In conclusion having siege engines in the SCA battlefield does not conflict with history, even though engines used in battle was a rare sight I feel it brings colour and variety to the game we play.



Beginning Archery in the S.C.A.



Part 3



Now that you have obtained a bow, you need arrows to shoot! Any wooden arrows with feathered fletches are legal for use in the SCA but you still have some decisions to make. Cedar, pine and ash are the best woods for use in arrow shafts and they can be obtained fairly easily from an archery dealer. You can choose to use three or four feathers on your arrows, plastic nocks or self-nocks (grooves cut directly into the wood for the bowstring), field points (pointed tips for better target penetration) or target points (rounded tips for use with lighter bows). You can even get fletches in a variety of colours and shapes and coloured stains for your shafts to fancy them up and make them easier to identify. You can buy them "off-the-rack" as complete arrows, or you can buy everything separately and make them yourself.

However, there are two important things that you need to know before you buy ANY arrows. Firstly, if you plan on making your own arrows do NOT use dowels bought from a hardware store or lumberyard. It is vitally important to your safety that the grain of the wood in an arrow shaft runs completely from one end of the shaft to the other. Commercially available arrow shafts are cut this way but dowels are NOT. If the grain of the wood runs perpendicular to the length, across the diameter of the shaft, there is a very serious danger of the arrow exploding when shot from a bow. There is a tremendous amount of energy stored in a bow and when the string is released; the arrow bends before it starts to move. If the grain is the wrong way at any point in the shaft, it will break there and shatter the entire shaft. The potential for injury is great, with wood splinters flying everywhere. So please.... buy only commercially made arrow shafts.

Secondly, the most important characteristic for the true flight of an arrow is its "spine". The spine of an arrow is the amount of stiffness in the shaft, measured in pounds to make it easier to match shafts to the draw weight of your bow. As I mentioned above, an arrow bends upon release of the bowstring and how limp or stiff your shaft is plays a big part in the arrow's trajectory out of the bow. If the arrow is too stiff it will bend very little and shoot to the left (for a right-hander). If the arrow is too limp it will bend more and fly to the right. It will also "fishtail" as the arrow flies, first bending one way then springing back and bending the other way again and again until the arrow reaches the target. Another warning here - if the arrow is far too limp, it will bend enough to break and shatter. When the spine of the arrow is just right, the arrow will

bend around the bow when the string is released, but it will straighten immediately after passing the bow. It will remain straight for the rest of the flight to the target. This is also known as "Archer's Paradox".

A good rule-of-thumb for selecting the right spine of shaft for your bow is take the draw weight of your bow at 28 inches, add five pounds of spine for every inch that you draw over 28 inches or subtract five pounds of spine for every inch under 28 inches. If you are using a longbow with no arrow shelf (shooting off of your hand), subtract an additional five pounds. However, if you are already using a bow rated at 35 pounds and you draw less than 28 inches, you do not need any shafts spined lower than 30 pounds. As an example, if you are using a bow rated at 47 pounds and your draw length is 29 1/2 inches you should be looking to buy shafts spined between 52-57 pounds. You do not need to match the spine exactly, because of the nature of wood it will almost certainly be impossible to get all your shafts matched precisely.

One other aspect of arrows to consider is the physical weight. Arrows are normally weighed in grains, allowing for fine accuracy in measurement. If the weight of the arrows in a group varies too much, the lighter arrows will shoot slightly higher than the heavier ones. If you can get the weights of your arrows to differ less than 20 grains, you have a fine set of matched arrows. If the weights vary less than 5 grains, you have a great set!
