News and Notices From Politarchopolis

emos: Summary from Comments (re-print from last issue)

A total of 14 comments were received. Although all discussed one or more issues, not all issues were commented on by each.

- Why do we do demos? Some reasons given are for education, for recruitment or to entertain. How do you feel about these reasons, and do you feel that we adequately meet them? Are these valid reasons to donate our time and efforts?
 - Public Relations/Recruitment: 10 yes, 1 no
 - School demos/educational: 7 yes, 2 no

- Entertainment/fundraising: 2 yes
- > What displays or activities should we do at demos?
 - A number of suggestions were given
- Do we need to have different programs for different types of demos? Should we have a set of standard demo plans?
 - 8 yes, need different demo plans
 - 4 suggested that the person requesting the demo be quizzed as to what they were expecting us to do, eg living history, specific era, SCA recreation: so that appropriate displays could be provided
 - 3 suggested that our demo people be trained as to what to do/is expected of them at demos
- What do we charge for doing a demo? Should we charge for them? Under what circumstances?
 - Public Relations/Recruitment: 4 no
 - School demos/educational: 6 yes, nominal fee
 - Entertainment/fundraising: 5 yes, a couple with a comment of similar pricing as to other entertainers, e.g. DJ, band
- > What is the minimum notice that the Barony needs beforehand?
 - 1-3 weeks: 3
 - 4-6 weeks: 6

A couple of comments relating to our 'educational requirements' and tax status.

From corpora: (required for a group to be elevated to Kingdom) "A record of well-attended events together with regular study or guild meetings, demonstrations & other educational activities for the benefit of the members and the community at large."

My response: Whilst we as the SCA research and recreate to enjoy the Current Middle Ages, a large amount of the educational activities we provide are in the form of collegia to financial members as well as to the numerous non-members who regularly attend.

Tax status (From SCAA Finance Policy): income tax exempt.

To keep this status: In summary, use the money for the stated purposes & do not use any of the earnings to benefit of private individuals or organisations.

So, what's next....

Demos: get the different demo plans organised, min 4-6 weeks notice when requested, check with the person requesting a demo as to what they are expecting/desiring for the demo.

Another common comment was that we need up-to-date handouts and newcomer packs so that we can effectively follow up when members of the general public show interest. I am co-ordinating this and if anyone is willing to help out please contact me.

Currently Polit is without a Hospitaller, but when the next Hospitaller is appointed, the organisation of demos is not automatically part of the position.

Beginning Archery in the S.C.A.

Part 2



Choosing what style of bow you wish to shoot will be one of the most important decisions you make. There are just so many different types to choose from! Longbow, recurve, magyar, or crossbow. Should it be a take-down or a one-piece bow; self-bow or laminate; wood, fibreglass or both? Do you want something to match your persona or just something to enjoy on the range? Do you wish a fancy (expensive) or simple (cheap) bow? All very important considerations indeed and not to be taken lightly.

As this article will deal with first-time archers, the primary consideration will be expense and ease of use. Would you want to part with \$600 for a bow and then after shooting it twice decide that archery just isn't for you? I didn't think so.

Magyar bows shoot well, but depending on the model, can be very expensive. Expect to pay anywhere from \$300-600 for a new one. Medieval reproduction crossbows are also expensive and tricky to get shooting straight and true. Longbows can be found for a good price but are a little harder to master and more tiring on the arm muscles. In my opinion, the best bow for a beginner is just a simple recurve bow. They can be relatively inexpensive and are easy to shoot. The recurved limbs make drawing the string feel much smoother than that of a longbow and there is considerably less hand shock on release as well. Too much hand shock from a bow means less energy propelling the arrow and it can make using the bow very fatiguing. For a beginner, this can be very frustrating!

The next important consideration is choosing the draw weight of the bow. The draw weight is the amount of force (in pounds) exerted by the bow when it is held at full draw. This will be the energy that is transferred into the arrow when the string is released. Now everyone's draw length will be different and this effects the draw weight. The farther you pull back the bow, the heavier the draw weight becomes. So in order to make it easier to compare bows, a standard for marking the draw weights on bows has been adopted. On just about every bow you will find the draw weight marked on the lower limb, rated at a draw length of 28 inches. Once you know your own draw length and what weight you can pull, you can easily compare different bows.

To find your draw length, get some assistance from a friend. Draw your bow back to your anchor point, the place on your face or head that you consistently draw to, and have your friend measure quickly from where the arrow nocks onto the string to the very front of the bow. Now ease the bowstring back to its resting position. Never release a bowstring with no arrow in place! This is called

"dry-firing" and with no arrow to absorb the energy, all of it goes into the limbs, possibly causing serious damage to the bow.

You should find a bow that you can draw comfortably and hold for 10 seconds at your anchor point without shaking too much. If you shake a little, with regular practice your muscles will strengthen sufficiently to properly control the bow. If you have access to an archery tackle dealer or range, it may be possible to try out (or even rent) several types of bows with different draw weights and find what suits you best. If your SCA group holds regular archery practices you may be able to ask other archers about their bows and they may allow you to try pulling them. Then you will have a much better idea of what to look for yourself.

If you are a taller gentle, do not try to pull a bow with short limbs all the way back to your anchor point. The short limbs will not be designed to be pulled back so far and will be under enormous stress. Too much of that treatment will lead to breakage.

Now that you have a better idea of what to look for, there are many places that you can purchase bows: custom ordering from the manufacturer, archery equipment dealers, SCA merchants, friends, magazine ads, on the Internet, even garage sales. But a word of warning!!! If you set out to find a really CHEAP bow, remember that you WILL get what you pay for. Unless you know what defects to look for, you may wind up buying a bow that may fail on you unexpectedly and catastrophically! Protect yourself by taking someone with you that has some experience with bows. Your friendly neighbourhood archery marshal should be able to help with this. Seek them out!
