Inaugural Ulrich von Liechtenstein Heraldic Pas De Arms Tournament

Who: Barony of Stormhold (Melbourne)

When: 31st July

Where: Tournament – Darebin Parklands, end of Separation Street, Fairfield, VIC (Melways Map 31 D9)

A series of four competitions, each separated by two melees, will be fought to decide the champion of the day. The winner of each round will be recognised for their valour, as will the overall victor for the day. The most Heraldic display on the day and the best Heraldic Presentation (by a Herald) will each also be acclaimed.

Each competition will be fought as exchanged blows (10 blows each), single elimination. The four competitions to be run on the day will be in the disciplines of Sword & Shield, Great Sword, Mace & Shield and Halberds. Each fighter entering the tournament will have their own Herald (available on the day for a small fee) who will advise the lists of which competition the fighter will enter as well as introducing the fighter to the field and audience before each competition commences.

Fighters will score points for entering each competition, placing in the top 3 of each competition, winning a melee, heraldic display (including retainers, judged for each of the four competitions) and introduction by their Herald (also judged for each competition).

Each fighter on the day will also nominate a group, household or unit that they will be fighting for.

News of the Realm

 mportant message from the Earl Marshal - All marshals please note that your authorisation as marshal – any marshal - is NOT valid without a current membership. ALL marshals, not just knight/group marshals, are rostered officers of the Kingdom of Lochac and as such MUST be members.

Stewards of events should check the membership of any marshal they wish to use the services of for an event. If the

membership is not current he/she may not assume any of the duties of the marshallate.

I suspect there are many of us who are ignorant of this rule - I know I was!

 s of 17/6/04, swords and crossbows are now prohibited weapons in Victoria.

First the good news: The SCA has been granted a blanket exemption for swords, but you must be able to show a membership card/trainee card or authorisation card to prove you are entitled to the exemption. There are rules about storage and transportation of weapons, but they are basically common sense - no lock boxes needed, just keep it out of sight and not easily accessible.

And the bad news:

At this point the SCA does not have an exemption for the use of crossbows, but we will not give in yet. We have until 31st Aug to convince the justice dept that we should be eligible for exemption.

Although this does not directly affect Polit, these laws will affect those wayfaring to or through Victoria.

If further details are required the Victorian Government Gazette is available as a pdf on the web. It is the one dated 17/6/2004.

News From Polifarchopolis

Demos – it is felt that the time has come for the Barony to discuss the issue of Demos. Her Excellency Baroness Leta is trying to collate views, opinions and ideas about the demos that do. Several issues have been raised for which she needs a broader understanding of how the Barony feels. Please read the following issues and contact the Baroness to give you views and opinions.

- ❖ Why do we do demos? Some reasons given are for education, for recruitment or to entertain. How do you feel about these reasons, and do you feel we adequately meet them? Are these reasons valid?
- ❖ What do we charge for doing a demo? Should we charge for them? Under what circumstances?
- ❖ What is the minimum notice that the Barony needs beforehand? Please remember to account for organisational time, and that if it is a mid-week demo, people need to arrange time off.

- ❖ Who is available to do the demos and when are they available?

From the Baron: "I have had a couple enquires (some from another Barony) asking about the format for the table top siege competition. If your machine fails, you will be allowed attempt to repair, if it fails again it will be redrawn from the competition. The table top engine will be fired from a table (funny that) roughly 1mtr of the ground. The competition will be judge on the following.

One: range

Two: accuracy (target shoot)

Three: best period appearance.

Four: How well the engine can be scaled up and built for the SCA battlefield.

Range -

you get three shots to obtain the furthest range. 3 points for first, 2 points for second

Accuracy -

Direct fire, an upright A3 size target will be placed at 70% of your achieved range at the same height as the table, three shots, 1pt per hit. If you would like a picture of what will be on the target please email me.

Indirect fire will have a 1mtr diameter circle placed on the ground range of target will be 90% of your achieved range 2pts per hit, three shots

Best period appearance, explains itself really, 2pt. To be judge at the feast.

Most buildable, takes into account function, scalability to a SCA battlefield ready machine, safety, spirit of the siege rules etc, 2pts. to be judge by a couple of Barons after they have had a beer or two.

Remember the aim of this competition is to promote siege engines, please use the following guide lines and follow the spirit of competition, not what holes you find in the rules!

Read the competition guide lines carefully.

All engines must be of period design. Documentation is not required.

All ammunition will be a standard sized 27mm High bounce ball. If you need test ammunition you can either obtain a ball or two from Edmund (ok no more puns please!) or you can buy a bag of them from Clints.

The fully **assembled** engine must be able to fit inside a 1 foot cube box. The engine just needs to fit inside the 12 inch cube. That is to say that at some point in the normal operation of the engine it must fit inside the 12" cube. For example you could build a ballista that is 12 inches long and 16 inches wide when its arms are at rest, so long as when the string is drawn back to the trigger point the arms are now less than 12" across. Or you could build a trebuchet that the arm is 11" long (remember some of the counter weight will normally be in front of the arm) and the axle is 9" off the table, as when the arm is horizontal the engine will fit in the 12" box. **HOWEVER**, bringing a pile of pieces that fit inside the cube, that are then assembled to build a siege engine that at no time in its' normal operation fits inside the 12" box is NOT allowed.

Engines must be equipped with a safety device such as a winch to prevent accidental firing, also the machine must be fitted with a appropriate mechanical trigger that will be used for every shot.

Ammunition may not be tampered with in anyway prior to shooting and will be provided by me.

Enjoy sieving the day."

Recipe of the Month

Torta d'agli (Garlic Tart)

"Toy li agli e mondali e lessali; quando sono cocti metili a moglio in aqua freda e poy pistali e metili zafarone e formazo assay che sia fresco e lardo batuto e specie dolze e forte e distempere con ova e mitili ova passe e poy fa la torta."

"Take the garlic cloves and peel them and them boil them; when they are cooked, put them to soak in cold water, and then pound them and add saffron and plenty of cheese, which should be fresh, and chopped pork fat, and sweet and strong spices, and moisten with eggs, and add raisins, and then make the *torta*."

Pastry:

250g flour
125g butter
 $\frac{1}{3}$ cup water, approx
1 tsp salt
OR
Use commercial short pastry.

Filling

5 heads garlic
200g fresh or salt pork belly
165g whole milk cottage cheese
135g cream cheese
3 eggs
80g raisins
12 threads of saffron
salt to taste (omit if using salt pork belly)

Spice mixture

$\frac{1}{3}$ tsp each ground cloves, freshly grated nutmeg and ground ginger.
1 tsp each ground cinnamon and freshly ground black pepper.

To make the pastry – cut the butter into small pieces and rub into the flour until the mixture resembles sawdust. Dissolve the salt into half of the cold water and add to the flour mixture. Combine quickly with your fingertips, without overworking, just until the dough comes together. If necessary add more water as required. Wrap in plastic or waxed paper and refrigerate for at least 2 hours.

For the filling – Bring two pots of water to the boil. Break the garlic into cloves and scald them in one pot of water for 2-5 minutes. Drain and peel the garlic (scalding them makes them easier peel) and add to the second pot of boiling water. Reduce the heat and simmer for 15 minutes. Drain and transfer to a boil of cold water to cool. Leaving the fat on, mince the pork belly finely.

Drain and puree the cooked garlic with the saffron strands. Transfer to a mixing bowl and add the cheeses, the minced

pork, the eggs and the raisins. If you have used fresh pork, add a little salt to taste. Beat the mixture until it is smooth.

Roll out the pastry and line a deep, 22cm pie tin. Add the filling, then bake at 400°F/200°C for 45 minutes to one hour.

Tips:

- ❖ Put a tray under the torte as it may bubble over.
- ❖ Rub olive oil liberally over your hands before peeling the garlic to stop the smell lingering on your skin.
- ❖ Open all the windows! The garlic aroma while you are boiling it will be overpowering. One description of it was “a wave of garlic gas rolling down the hall, choking everyone in its wake.” You may wish to advise others to leave the house.

This is an unusual combination of sweet and savoury, with a creamy consistency and a decided but not overpowering garlic flavour. An unusual but surprisingly popular dish.

Siege Engines ~ Part Three

Baron Edmund continues his series of articles on Siege Engines.

Torque it up.

As with modern firearms, where each is designed for the calibre of the projectile, so each siege engine is designed to fire a specific type, size and weight of projectile.

Ancient engineers had developed formulae to use when determining the size of a siege engine. For bolt throwers, the diameter of the cord bundle should be 1/9 the length of the projectile you wish to fire. For engines that shoot stone balls, the ratio is a little more complex. The diameter of cord bundle is to be equal to the cube root of [100 times the weight of the projectile]; however the ‘simplicity’ of this formula is for lengths measured in dactyls (approx. 19.8 millimetres) and weight expressed in minas (approx. 437 grams).

Both of the above formulae will give you the optimal volume for the cord bundle, or as it is sometimes known, the rope spring. By using multiples of the dimension of the cord bundle, the rest of the machine can be scaled up.

To make the engine perform at its maximum potential, the cord bundle needs to store its maximum potential energy (to produce maximum kinetic energy) without stressing the structural integrity of the frame. Obvious really.

If the length of the cord bundle is too short the result will be too much internal friction within the cord bundle, which will cause excess stress to be generated and transferred to the throwing arms, possibly breaking them. Or if the bundle is too long the complete opposite problem will occur, with the cord bundle unable to produce enough stored energy, resulting in having no power with which to throw your projectile.

When building and playing with stored energy and moving parts always be aware of where your body parts are, otherwise you will find yourself trying to explain to a nurse the fundamentals of torsion power.
